Definitions (Consortium on Chicago School Research)

3rd -8th On-Track: Students who have As, Bs, or Cs in math and reading and over 95% attendance are considered on-track.

9th Grade On-Track: Students are on-track if they earn at least five full-year course credits and no more than one semester F in a core course in their first year of high school.

Five Year Dropout Rate: Calculated by following a cohort of freshman students and how many drop out of school within five years



Best practice checklist:

- School-Level PLTs Are Integrated
 Student Support Teams
- □ PLTs vary in size
- Have at least one designated leader responsible for regular organizing, monitoring, and outcomes for the group
- Have clear member roles and responsibilities
- Everyone must feel valued in order to invest time in the PLT.
 Make sure everyone can see and feel the value in each meeting!

- Accomplish tasks that drive postsecondary achievement
- Provide space and structure for strategic thinking, planning, and action

Purpose:

- Learn new strategies
- Share practices among network PLTs
- Report out and analyze progress monitoring data
- Connect with postsecondary partners

Early Engagement

- Intentional Middle School Counseling Strategy
 - Naviance student goal setting with GPA
 - High School application process
- For three consecutive years (2016 2018) KKC has hosted CPS High School Fair with an average participation of 900 8th grade students
 - Included tour of campus
 - Presentation by student leaders and professors
- High School and College Readiness Program with TRIO Talent Search Program (Kershaw E.S. Adoption)





Early Engagement

- Expanded in 2018 to include 7th Grade Leadership Summit
 - Student Voice Committee
 - Community Problem Solving workshop
 - College Presentation including Early College Options
- In 2019, Added 8th Grade Basketball Tournament and 6th Grade Male Mentoring Conference

Approximately 3500 middle school to college interactions since 2016










Dual Credit

- An academic arrangement in which eligible high school students can take college credit courses at their high schools
- Students earn both HS and College Credit
- Taught by a qualified and approved high school instructor.
- High School instructors are partnered with a CCC faculty member who serves as their faculty coordinator to ensure the academic quality and rigor of the course is met.


Dual Enrollment

- An academic arrangement in which eligible high school students can take college credit courses at any of the seven City Colleges of Chicago, FREE.
- CCC covers tuition and costs of textbooks.
- CPS pays for transportation.


- The Early College Program has been growing steadily
- 150 CCC faculty coordinators ensure academic quality and integrity (AY18)




- 80 High School partners throughout the city of Chicago (AY18)
 - Approximately 20 partners at KKC




FY18 Early College Enrollment by Ethnicity, with % Total Early College Enrollment




FY18 Early College Enrollment by Ethnicity, with % Total Early College Enrollment



Early College Matriculation to CCC, with % of total credit enrollment




Early College Matriculation to KKC, with % of total credit enrollment



City Colleges of Chicago, STAR Scholars Program

- Three year City Colleges scholarship for Chicago Public High School graduation seniors with:
 - 3.0 or higher GPA
 - Enrolls by fall in City College's academic pathways no later than one year from their high school graduation
 - Earns a ACT score of 17 or better in English and Math, or an SAT score of 480 in reading & writing and 440 in math
- STAR Scholar Program is available to undocumented students
- Includes four-year transfer guarantees and scholarship opportunities with over twenty public and private university partners



Building a Future... New Englewood HS

The New Englewood STEM High School opened in fall 2019 with an inaugural freshman class, and will add one grade each subsequent year until it serves grades 9-12 beginning in school year 2022-23.



Building a Future... New Englewood HS

Basic Certificate

15+ credit course sequence

Examples include:

- Computer Information Systems
- Alternative Fuels
- Straight to career
- Complete higher level certificates/associate degree
- Begin/transfer to 4-year university

Advanced Certificate

30 credit course sequence

Examples include:


- Networking Systems & Tech
- HVAC
- Straight to career
- Complete associate degree
- Begin/transfer to 4-year university

Associate Degree/ Significant Credit

60 credit course sequence

Examples include:

- Web development
- General education



- Complete associate degree
- Transfer to 4-year university at sophomore/junior standing

All graduates will minimally earn 12 college credits
