





















"My brother and sister got married instead of going to college. I'm not going to do that! I am going to college first!"

Student Reflections

"As an AVID student, I found it very rewarding to help other students fill out college applications and work towards their dreams."

"I thought it was too late to get myself back on track for college. Now I know I can still go to college and have a plan to do so." "I assumed I couldn't go to college because my family doesn't have the money to pay for school. Now I know there is the Dream Act and I am excited to start planning for college."

"I didn't think I could get into college and didn't plan on going to college, but now I am very excited that I applied to MSJC. I can't wait to go to college!" "I had one student, who has been deviant and unfocused all year come to me during a break and say, he is going to reset his focus button and do better the rest of the year."

"One student let me know how helpful it was to go through the application process at school since parents don't speak English and didn't graduate from HS."

"Several students reflected that they learned that it is important for them to participate in meaningful non-academic activities throughout high school as a benefit to their own development, as well as their potential college candidacy."

"Our students enjoyed hearing the multiple routes our staff took to be in the same position. It gave them hope."

"I had a lot of kids who were just excited for the opportunity to talk about the future and start making efforts to reach their goals."

"There were multiple students that asked about where I went to college because they saw the college kick off poster on the front board. This gave me an opportunity to talk about college and answer their questions."

"One student that applied to college said he did not think he would ever be able to go to college."

A student came to inquire more about attending college after taking the PSAT even though she was not A-G. I think this opportunity was an experience which got her thinking about college and her future.






AP Enrollment









District Graduation Rate








County Graduation Rates

College/Career Indicator Model

All students in the four-year graduation cohort minus students who take the California Alternate Assessment.

WELL PREPARED - To Be Determined

The College/Career Indicator (CCI) measures for "Well Prepared" will be determined following further review of potential state and local CCI measures as statewide data becomes available. California Department of Education staff, with input from education researchers, practitioners, and stakeholders, will evaluate the CCI model through the first phase of the Local Control Funding Formula evaluation rubrics and will propose a revised CCI model for implementation in 2017–18.

PREPARED

Does the graduate meet at least 1 measure below?

- A. Career Technical Education (CTE) Pathway Completion plus one of the following criteria:
 - Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments: At least a Level 3 "Standard Met" on English language arts/literacy (ELA) or Mathematics and at least a Level 2 "Standard Nearly Met" in the other subject area
 - One semester/two quarters of Dual Enrollment with passing grade (Academic/CTE subjects)
- B. At least a Level 3 "Standard Met" on both ELA and Mathematics on Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments
- C. Completion of two semesters/three quarters of Dual Enrollment with a passing grade (Academic and/or CTE subjects)
- D. Passing Score on two Advanced Placement (AP) Exams or two International Baccalaureate (IB)
 Exams
- E. Completion of courses that meet the University of California (UC) a-g criteria plus one of the following criteria:
 - CTE Pathway completion
 - Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments: At least a Level 3 "Standard Met" on ELA or Mathematics and at least a Level 2 "Standard Nearly Met" in the other subject area
 - One semester/two quarters of Dual Enrollment with passing grade (Academic/CTE subjects)
 - Passing score on one AP Exam OR on one IB Exam

- A. CTE Pathway completion
- B. Scored at least Level 2 "Standard Nearly Met" on one or both ELA and Mathematics Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments
- C. Completion of one semester/two quarters of Dual Enrollment with passing grade (Academic/CTE subjects)
- D. Completion of courses that meet the UC a-g criteria
